1.2 Strength, Weakness, Opportunity and Challenges(SWOC)

Institutional Strength

SMHS Govt. College, Mohali is a leading Post Graduate Co-educational college in the fields of Arts, Science and Commerce. It provides gender sensitive and empowering education which helps students to realize their full potential and enable them to make a significant contribution in all spheres of national and global development.

The College has a robust system of **collection of feedback** from students, teachers, alumni, and parents. The suggestions given by the stakeholders are regularly analyzed and appropriate action is taken to incorporate suggestions into all aspects of the functioning in the institution.

The college upholds the dignity and worth of every individual who is a member of this institution. It has a **"zero-tolerance policy"** towards sexual harassment. Verbal and non-verbal physical misconduct of sexual nature is never tolerated.

The **low fee structure** aims at supporting the backward and deprived sections of society, particularly from the rural areas. SMHS Govt. College admits students from diverse backgrounds, specially the economically weaker and socially backward classes. The majority of the students avail Post matric scholarships provided by the Government.

An active **Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC)** plays a central role in monitoring, augmentation and sustenance of the overall quality of the institution. The IQAC works in a systematic manner to promote consistent and catalytic action to improve the academic and administrative performance of the institution.

The college tries to foster a culture of **eco-friendly practices** to make the campus environmentally sustainable. The campus produces minimum waste, conserve bio diversity and tries to be self-sustainable in areas of power, water and cleanliness.

The National Service Scheme is the one of most effective programs of the college. The aim of the NSS is to give the students an orientation to serve the community while they study. The NSS unit enrolls volunteers who uphold the NSS motto "Not me but you". Health and social awareness programs, Free Medical Checkups, Blood Donation Camps, Vaccination Camps, Swaach Bharat Campaign, Promotion of a Green Environment, Plastic Eradication Campaign, visit to orphanage, old age homes are just some of the activities conducted in the college.

Institutional Weakness

For enhancement of institutional growth and development, the number of permanent teaching staff in the college needs to be increased.

The college is a constituent college of Punjabi University, Patiala and is bound to follow the curriculum device by the University and therefore flexibility in curriculum design and delivery is limited.

Limited resources in the use of digital technology to enhance teaching learning on campus.

The college is funded by the Government but has limited financial resources to cater to growing academic needs which require enhanced resources for teaching learning requirements for students and faculty members. The campus needs up-gradation of facilities.

Institutional Opportunity

- The college is situated in an emerging IT hub in and around the Union Territory of Chandigarh. This provides ample opportunity for exposure of students in the field of Information and Technology.
- The majority of the students from Arts, Commerce, Science and Computers streams get enrolled for pursuance of higher education in reputed universities and HEIs.
- The students opting for NCC and NSS has a better chance to be placed in Army, Police and Para military forces.
- The college offer job-oriented Ads-on courses to instil industry relevant skills for better job placements. The Hospitality Diploma offered is one of its kind in the region.
- Extra-Curricular activities like Elocution, Quiz, Poster Making, Slogan Writing, Creative Writing and Collage making etc. develop overall personality of the students and instil confidence.

Institutional Challenge

- Low payment to guest faculty which leads to low quality teaching.
- The major disadvantage for a Government run institution is competition with the private sector with a variety of courses, advanced IT and learning resources and sufficient number of well-trained faculty.
- Inadequate infrastructure to cater to the growing demands of the students especially in meeting the global standards.
- Poor academic standard of learners at entry level in almost all programmes.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

SMHS Govt. College, Mohali is a constituent college under Punjabi University, Patiala follows a predetermined syllabus. However, the college innovates within these established academic structures, committed to providing holistic development of its student body.

Academic processes in SMHS Govt. College, Mohali are streamlined, with timetables, workloads and other administrative tasks prepped well in advance of teaching sessions.

The intellectual teaching body of SMHS Govt. College, Mohali is supported by relevant ICT. The college enjoys technologically enabled and inclusive infrastructure including a well-equipped library, which makes it possible for the students to participate in a modern teaching-learning process.

Our teachers regularly update their disciplinary knowledge through active involvement in faculty development programmes, curriculum reviews, evaluation, and participation in different decision- making bodies of the University. Experiential learning through internships projects and field trips is specifically facilitated. SMHS Govt. College, Mohali incorporates an empathetic approach, trying to familiarize the students about environmental concerns, gender based inequalities and the importance of ethics in the development of the nation.

SMHS Govt. College, Mohali is one of the few colleges that offers a range of dedicated add- on certificate courses in pharmaceuticals, Spoken English, Early childhood Care and education, Tourism and hospitality management, etc. These aid students' skill developments and prepare them for the professional world.

A strong tutorial and mentor-ward system enables smaller groups of students to discuss and are individualize issues related to interdisciplinary and ethics.

Education is dialogic, and it is the feedback system that gives it this transparency and accountability. Feedback is taken on forms available on website, the data is compiled, analyzed and shared with each Department and concerned individuals for prompt action. Channels for communication with different stakeholders are kept warm by responding to diverse needs. The IQAC conducts annual internal audits and all Departments are encouraged to undertake self-assessment to critically reflect on their practices. This approach supports the amalgamation of the interests of the stakeholders as well as the Institution.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

The college focuses on holistic intellectual, social, emotional and aesthetic development of the students. We try to we work conscientiously to reflect upon and enhance our pedagogic methods.

Right from admission, the college follows a well-administered and transparent procedure with ease of availability of information on our website. and admission portal. A Grievance Committee looks into admission related problems of the students.

With the intention to develop critical and innovative thinking, student centered pedagogies are evolved at the department level. Some prefer case study approach, while others prefer brainstorming duly supported by ICT and e-resources.

Remedial courses and elaborate tutorial sessions are aimed at supporting learners in small groups so that teachers can provide individual support. Special attention is given to students with special needs and also from economically weaker sections. Students are also supported through a well-designed mentor ward system.

The evaluation procedure is elaborated upon in the prospectus and restated during subsequent classes to ensure effective implementation of the internal assessment. Students are assessed on a continuous basis through innovative and reformed techniques such as group discussions, assignments, analytical tests, practical's and projects. Accordingly, remedial classes and other techniques are used to support learners with different abilities and pace. Students with advanced needs are encouraged to research and given more challenging tasks. All students are encouraged to participate in inter-college competitions to optimize their potential.

Students are given multiple opportunities to succeed. Through internal assessment students are encouraged and guided to improve their responses with more than one attempt at times. An online system helps students to view

their marks at the end of each semester. Aiding that is a democratic teacher-student interaction, which makes it easier to report any discrepancies in the process before marks are uploaded on the University portal.

Research, Innovations and Extension

The teachers of the college engage in research and publish papers in journals in UGC-CARE list and are resource persons in various conferences and seminars.

Seminars and FDP and conferences are arranged and attended by the faculty.

Extension Activities are organized by the college societies including NSS, NCC to sensitize students about social realities and challenges.

Internships and fieldtrips are encouraged to strengthen experiential learning. Departments of Psychology, Home science and computer have agreements with institutions (schools and hospitals etc.) for on-the-job training and internships.

IQAC has facilitated MOU with Jagat Guru Nanak Dev Open University, Patiala to enhance skill based training programs.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

- The college has an extensive green cover and aesthetically designed buildings which are architecturally striking and responsive to environmental concerns. The college has a peacock reserve consisting of at least 100 beautiful peacocks.
- The teaching block has well-appointed and spacious ICT enabled classrooms, tutorial and department rooms. The English department, B. Voc (Hospitality) and Computer departments have labs that are well-designed and adequately equipped with learning resources. The library is air conditioned, Wi-Fi enabled with relevant hardware and software, and a rich repertoire of learning resources.
- The College has a girl's hostel with a capacity for 50 girls and a boy's hostel with a capacity of 35 boys. These hostels cater to SC students and are totally free of cost. A kitchen garden for organically grown vegetables caters to the hostel students and hospitality department.
- The college takes pride in its green canteen, keeping regular checks on the kitchen and related areas to ensure hygiene and satisfactory food experience for our students.
- The college has a compressive sports and fitness infrastructure. We have a stadium with professional track built to international standards. The outdoor sports facilities include football court, Basketball court, Badminton court, handball, hockey ground and open space for yoga and kabaddi etc. There is a judo hall for girls and a conditioning gym for both boys and girls.
- The "Subrang Hall" is a majestic auditorium with a sitting capacity of 1000 persons.

Student Support and Progression

- SMHS Govt. College, Mohali has created a fabric of social inclusion and empowerment, through student-centric financial incentives and welfare measures.
- SMHS Govt. College, Mohali provides a number of scholarships and fellowships in addition to the government freeships available to the students. To reduce the dropout rate the college under its Parent Teacher Association provide support to marginalized students so that they can continue education. Many students have benefitted from this funding support over the last five years, highlighting SMHS Govt. College, Mohali contribution in broadening access to higher education.
- In addition to financial support, SMHS Govt. College, Mohali has active students' grievance redressal mechanisms that help them seek redressal for complaints, including those about sexual harassment and ragging. For the students' emotional well-being, SMHS Govt. College, Mohali also offers formal inhouse counseling.
- As the number of students seeking admission to undergraduate education has increased over the last five years, there have also been a significant number of students graduating from SMHS Govt. College, Mohali and pursuing higher education in India and abroad. Institutional provisions facilitate vertical movement of students to higher levels and gainful employment.
- The Placement cell facilitates the students' professional growth and success as many leading IT Companies from the Moahli IT Hub and Hospitality sector all over the country recruit a substantial number of students from the college.
- SMHS Govt. College, Mohali also facilitates students' representation and engagement in various administrative, and co- curricular activities through a formal student council body that is elected annually by active participation of all students.
- The institution has various co-curricular, cultural and sports activities to ensure the holistic development of the students. Students actively participate in extension activities through NCC, NSS, etc.
- Many sports and cultural events have been held at SMHS Govt. College, Mohali over the last five years and we have won many awards and trophies over these five years.

Governance, Leadership and Management

- SMHS Govt. College, Mohali has a transparent and multi layered governance system. The DHE is the government branch of administration. They meets on a regular basis and direct colleges all over Punjab. Similarly, Staff Council meetings are held periodically for the effective planning and implementation of teaching, learning and administrative programmes. Student Council meetings are also held at regular intervals to address student related issues.
- As per Governmental rules, the college has implemented welfare schemes, and a range of developmentoriented programmes for the teaching and non-teaching staff.
- SMHS Govt. College, Mohali governance is marked by transparency, inclusivity and accountability. Feedback from various stakeholders like students, teachers, employers and alumni is invited through online feedback forms. It is then analyzed, and appropriate action is taken and shared with the Governing Body. Staff Council and IQAC monitor the quality of the teaching-learning process, while the management facilitates smooth functioning of teaching and support systems.
- An Internal Audit Report is given by IQAC to each department. Each department is also given a tool for self-reflection (Self-Assessment Performa) to take suitable action collectively. They give all departments and concerned staff of the college feedback to critically reflect on their practices and plan ahead. Besides this, external academic audit is also conducted regularly. Teachers are encouraged to carry out a self-appraisal every year so as to gain insight into the effectiveness of their teaching style

and its impact on students.

- The College follows performance appraisal procedures as per the norms of Government of India. Accordingly, each employee is expected to fill an Annual Performance Appraisal Report (APAR) and submit it to the concerned authority. The grievances are further heard by the College Grievance Cell under the chairpersonship of the Principal.
- The college conducts internal and external financial audits on a regular basis. The audit wing of the UGC visits the college periodically and inspects all files pertaining to the financial matters that the college has availed of, as well as all the receipts and payments in the college.

Shaheed Major Harminderpal Singh (Shaurya Chakra) Government College, Sahibzada Ajit Singh Nagar (Mohali) is an affiliated college to Punjabi University Patiala, which is a state university; as such, it adheres to the curriculum and structure established by the affiliating university. The institution will adhere to the guidelines of the affiliated university and the state's Higher Education Department. The College will follow the roadmap prepared by the University or the Education Department to implement the ABC. In line with this, as per the direction received from Directorate of Higher Education, Government of Punjab, In January 2023, the college organized a special drive to onboard all the enrolled students on the ABC portal. Also. at the College level, programmes have been initiated by several Departments such as Fine Arts and Home Science in which students are assigned credits/weightages in internal assessment on behalf of their work in various projects.

The purpose of these courses is to equip students with such skills that will make them employable along with the regular degree courses. Various activities are held throughout the year by the Fine Arts and Home Science departments to instill the knowledge of India's rich and diverse culture in the students. Response:

The main aim of the college is to deliver a curriculum for the students to achieve the vision of the college of developing young men and women for a holistic and meaningful life. There are various components of the curriculum delivery mechanism that the college has evolved over the course of its existence.

The college has a well-developed college curriculum policy guiding the teaching staff towards developing and delivering an enriched curriculum towards holistic development of the students. Though, the college strictly follow the curriculum prescribed by the Punjabi University, the faculty members are encouraged to go beyond what is prescribed for holistic development of students.

The Time-Table is prepared well-in-advance and displayed on the college notice board as well as on the web-site. The head of the department distributes the work load equally among all the faculty members. The time-table committee headed by the Principal and a senior faculty member ensures that for the holistic development of personality all activities are included in the plan. The policies and guidelines are prepared to ensure the all-round development of students. Theory, practical, tutorials, seminars, Add-on-courses, life-skills, N.S.S, N.C.C, participation in sports are all included in the academic calendar. Faculty members efficiently deliver the lectures using ICT and smart classrooms.

It is ensured that syllabus is completed within stipulated time frame and revision is done from time to time. Sections are made judiciously so that students can participate actively in group discussions. Apart from Mid-Semester test, assignments are taken and monthly tests are also conducted.

There is a provision of remedial classes for students weak in studies so that they can done up their skills also. For all round development of the student's extra-curricular activities are arranged from time to time by various departments. Periodic meetings of IQAC take stock of the progress of the teaching learning among other things scholars are also invited to deliver special lectures relevant to the student's environmental science is also a part of the curriculum and students are motivated to actively participate in lectures, poster making and other completions.

To execute the curriculum effectively HOD's conducts the meetings of their respective departments once in fifteen days. All the faculty members of the concerned department give their valuable inputs regarding various agenda items and unanimous decision is arrived at to benefit the students lesson plans are prepared by the teachers. Unitization of syllabus is done and all the teachers make it a point to follow it. Program outcomes are developed for each program and course outcomes. A student centric approach is adopted in teaching methods along with other strategies to actively engage students in the learning process. The institute focuses on delivering enquiry-based instruction, wherein the students are encouraged to ask questions, think critically and be a part of the teaching-learning process by engaging them in planning various activities of the department as well as the institution. This approach is used to enhance and improve students' creativity and ability to think critically. Further, every department of the college is equipped with smart boards and projectors that are used to enhance the quality of content delivery to the students. Relevant reading materials are shared with the students through Whatsapp groups, video lectures are also shared as well as screened for the students and interactive digital content has been developed by the faculty members to enrich the learning experience of the students.

Further, the Institution in its teaching-learning process follows the 'learning by doing' concept by engaging students in community centric assignments, project field work, practical training in skill development, developing communication skills, character building and personality development. Response:

In the College, there is a well-established mechanism through which students are assessed throughout the academic year on various parameters. Internal assessment is conducted through Unit Tests/Monthly Tests and MSTs. Assignments are another way through which students are assessed. The Internal assessment is added in the final assessment of the students. There are monthly tests, assignments which are given to students and their performance is duly analyzed. Along with that, students are also involved in other extracurricular activities and their performance is analyzed on the basis of their performance in these activities also. Further, as per the guidelines issued by the Punjabi University, Patiala, the Internal assessments for general subjects is divided in three parts viz. assignments, attendance and Mid Semester Test. This Internal Assessment forms part of the assessment of the students in final exams. Assignments are assigned to students either on the topic of syllabus or on a learning criterion which enhances not only their subject knowledge but also gives them an overview of practical aspect.

Internal Examinations in the college is conducted throughout the year at regular intervals wherein MST being a major component, conducted once in each semester. The MST is based purely on the university final examinations guidelines. The exams are conducted, evaluated and thereafter presented to students for self-appraisal. The students can cross check the assessment and can clarify their doubts regarding assessment of Assignments and MST. Assignments are also assigned as per the choice of the students so that they can prepare the topic accordingly. MSTs are planned beforehand for the whole college and are conducted just like final exams.

The affiliating university also allows the students for re-evaluation and rechecking facility. Students who have grievance related to external examination such as result later, result awaited or any other problem give application to the principal after which the university clerk of the college recommends the case and provide liaison with the university for speedy redressal.

Response:

The success of any programme or course and its ensuing outcome can be assessed only through comprehensive time bound assessment of the students. The college therefore, uses various tools to gauge the capability of the students in attaining the desired results in terms of knowledge and practicality of the course content which in turn ensures the attainment of a given programme outcome and course outcome. The same are communicated to the students in the formal way of the discussion in the classroom and departmental notice board. The learning outcomes are measured on the basis of completion of syllabus, internal assessment, setting up of question paper, final examinations, results and placements. Some of the key indicators of measuring attainment are:

- Mid Semester Examinations: Mid semester examinations, which includes about 60% of the syllabus of a respective semester, serve as an extremely effective tool to evaluate the performance of the students. These examinations prove to be an effective yardstick for the students to measure their own performance keeping in view the impending final exams. Special tests are conducted for the students who missed the MSTs or fail to meet the minimum criteria for appearing in University final examination.
- Internal assessment: Internal assessment is calculated as per the university norms based on their performance in mid semester examinations and regularity and participation in the classroom activities. The internal assessment constitutes a significant weightage in total marks in each subject.
- Final Semester Examinations: The final evaluation of a student's academic performance is done through Punjabi University theory and practical examinations held every semester. The university appoints center superintendents, deputy and invigilators apart from flying squads to ensure fair examination.
- Class Activities: The evaluation of the home assignments, presentations and project reports/ practical files prepared by the students on specific topics from within their syllabi helps the teachers to gauge their progression in terms of comprehension of the subject and their basic understanding of the concepts.
- Practical/ Viva-Voce Examinations: The practical examinations are conducted to assess the students' level of understanding of the particular subject. During Practical exams, the presence of an invigilator from outside the college ensures an impartial conduct of assessment of the students.
- Feedback Report: The college collects feedback related to completion of the syllabus, level of attainment of knowledge and skills from the students and teachers. This helps in analyzing the attainment of PO and CSO.

Student Progression and Placement: Finally, the overall outcome of the course/ programme is evident from the successful progression of students in terms of their admission to higher education or their placements.

Response:

Creation and enhancement of infrastructure is an on-going process in institution. Even though the college has been established for more than 40 years, it is able to cope up with pressures of modern requirements of teaching learning institution. There are approximately 50 classrooms which are spacious and well lit equipped with furniture for students and faculty. The college proudly possesses its smart labs which have been set up to teach effectively in order to enhance the students attention span in the class. There are four big lecture halls in the science block which are used for regular classes as well as for special lecture sessions by experts or other activities. The college advisory committee reviews the course requirements, students' needs, working condition of different equipment, apparatus and also requirement of repair or purchase of any device from time-to-time. In the session 2022-23 new infrastructure has also been added keeping in the mind the needs of the students. As our college is Model Degree College among the four colleges of the State the RUSA grant comes for construction, renovation and purchase of new equipment's. Sitting spaces has been created both inside the college building and outside within the college campus. Also, a Girls Common Room has been created. Furniture and fixture was purchased for renovation of girls common room under equity grant. Vending Machine, Water cooler and Racks have been installed in girls common room. From this year (2022-23) we have given facility of hostel to girl students. Six girl students are living in the hostel. There is a student centre is used for celebrating National days. Students activities are also organised in the main auditorium- the Sabrang hall. Under beautification Head of renovation component of RUSA grant green lawns were made in front of main building. Barbed wire was installed for peacock preservation. Submersible pump has been installed to deal with water scarcity problem as we had lot of grievances from students regarding water supply. Further, Rain Water Harvesting Project is installed on all college buildings by Soil And Conservation Department, Punjab under RUSA grant for Model Degree College.

The college ensures using high-tech digital devices like LCD screens, projectors, smart teaching devices to maximize the students' participation in curricular and co-curricular activities. Recently, a lot of improvement has been made in the available infrastructure like IT-based in order to make the teaching-learning process student centric. The College Campus is equipped with 11 high speed broadband connections on optical fibre cable with Wi-Fi optical network technical of bandwidth upto 100 mbps. For paper vigilance college campus is equipped with 40 CCTV cameras, which covers every necessary area like college entrance & exit, all corridors, class rooms, labs, library etc. Each department equipped with smart board and the college has 3 Computer labs for I.T Students having around 75 computers fully updated with new version of windows and other necessary hardware. further, a newly built seminar hall

with latest peripherals like mic & interactive smart board have developed.

The institution functions under the Directorate of Higher Education, Punjab. Principal is the overall incharge. The college follows all policies laid down by the Punjab Administration and Panjabi University in true letter and spirit. In teaching, the college has adopted a functional layout on the basis of specialized disciplines, wherein the senior-most faculty member is the incharge of the department with Professors/Associate Professors/Assistant Professors as faculty. outcomes. A lot of emphasis is being laid on the use of ICT for the modernization of education over the past few years. The Academic Calendar is prepared in advance, as directed by Punjabi University Patiala, which is displayed and circulated to the faculty and

students in order to be strictly followed. Admission to various programmes, summer & winter vacations, mid-semester tests, examination schedule are notified in the Academic Calendar. All the newly admitted students are made aware of the philosophy, discipline, culture, compulsory and elective courses, teaching-learning process, various curricular, co-curricular & extra-curricular activities, comprehensive and continuous evaluation and general code of conduct of the Institute. Students have also been sensitized of the directions issued by the Department of Health and Family Welfare, Govt. of Punjab to ensure appropriate COVID-19 precautions and measures. The college strictly adheres to its Annual Gender Sensitization Plan to ensure that measures promoting gender equity. The curriculum across all streams emphasizes importance of equality, tolerance, and diversity among all religions and cultures. To promote gender equity among students, the college organizes various programs, including female-oriented celebrations like Teej festival, cooking, personal grooming, stitching, embroidery, and painting competitions. These activities aim to encourage students to appreciate the richness of culture and promote women empowerment.

The college celebrates International Women's Day every year on 8th March to sensitize students about women's rights. Esteemed personalities from various fields are invited to motivate and inspire the students, and various competitions are organized to promote women empowerment. Moreover, the Department of Physical Education conducts self-defence workshops for girl students, in which experts in martial arts provide them with techniques to defend themselves in adverse situations. The workshop introduced Judo as a sport and self-defence mechanism and trains students with various skills and tools.

The college provides a safe environment for girls and prevents the presence of indecent crowds by not allowing outsiders to enter the college premises. It prioritizes the safety and security of its students by providing an escort service to students during late hours and a counselling facility offered by the Department of Psychology. The guidance and counselling cell actively helps students with their psychological and emotional needs by providing a WhatsApp group where students can ask questions anonymously. Additionally, the college has a common room facility for female students.

Our college has implemented various programs to promote gender equity. These programs include events such as Nukkad Natak on anti-drug abuse, blood donation camps, World AIDS Day, Diwali Mela on the theme of Shunning drugs and following a nutritious diet, and 'Hunar to Rozgar' to display and sell handicraft items made by students. The aim behind organising all these activities is to provide equal opportunities for participation to all genders, without any form of discrimination. The college encourages girls to participate in various curricular and co-curricular activities and provides them with equal opportunities for gender sensitization. The institution promotes gender equity by organizing various activities on themes such as 'Save the Girl Child', 'Beti Bachao, Beti Padhao', International Women's Day, and many more. The Voter Card Committee held a state-level quiz competition on the role of women in elections and politics on March 8, 2021.

Activities The NSS unit visited a "Shelter for the Homeless" on June 3, 2023, and provided the needy with clothing, utensils, footwear, and other household items that were contributed by staff and students. Thus, the college's efforts to promote constitutional values and rights among students extend beyond the campus, making a significant impact. The entire college staff and students also sang the National Anthem on August 12, 2021, and the video of the same was sent as per the instructions of Directorate, Higher Studies, Government of Punjab. On September 25, 2020, the Postgraduate Department of Fine Arts organized a poster-making activity on "Human Rights" to raise awareness among students about their rights. Government College Mohali participates in the Republic Day and Independence Day parade, promoting a sense of national pride and patriotism among the students. The Postgraduate Department of Fine Arts organized a poster exhibition on Covid-19 awareness, where students spread the message to wear masks, maintain social distance, and practice good hygiene. Expert Talks and Lectures The college also invites experts to give talks and lectures on constitutional values and rights. The goal of the event was to raise awareness on road safety among students. By instilling in students a set of values, rights, and duties, the college prepares them to become responsible and engaged citizens.

Response:

Best Practice No. 1

Title: Constructing Rainwater Harvesting System

Objective: A rainwater harvesting system captures and stores rainwater from rooftops, roads, and other surfaces, reducing waste and promoting sustainable usage. It stores it in underground tanks for irrigation, cleaning, and flushing, reducing water demand and promoting sustainable development. Implementing a rainwater harvesting system is a crucial step towards conserving natural resources and promoting sustainable development.

The Context: Our college is Punjab's first government college to start a rain-water harvesting system under the aegis of the Department of Soil and Conservation, Government of Punjab. Conservation and Management of Soil and Water Resources in Collaboration with Stakeholders for Sustainable Development is the mission statement of the department and our college has taken a giant leap in this direction. This is undoubtedly one of the best practices our college takes pride in.

The Practice: The college conducted a feasibility study to determine the most suitable catchment areas

for the rainwater harvesting system. To ensure the success of the rainwater harvesting system, experts were consulted during the setup and maintenance phases. These experts provided guidance on how to design and install the system to ensure that it operates efficiently and effectively. They also provided recommendations on how to maintain the system to ensure that it continues to function optimally over time. Efforts were made to maintain the rainwater harvesting system regularly to ensure optimal performance. This includes cleaning the catchment areas, filters, and storage tanks to prevent clogging and ensure that the water quality is maintained.

Evidence of Success: Rainwater collection and storage on college campuses promote sustainable water conservation practices, reducing reliance on costly and energy-intensive sources like groundwater and municipal water supply. The rainwater harvesting system captures rainwater from rooftops, roads, and surfaces, stores it in underground tanks, and filters and treats it before use. Regular maintenance ensures optimal performance and prevents clogging or contamination. The system comprises multiple roof surfaces that direct water into large tanks optimized for groundwater replenishment and percolation, with a total annual capacity of 1.5 million litres. Of this, 1.3 million litres are used for groundwater recharge, while the remaining 200,000 litres are available for general consumption on the campus. Three large tanks with a capacity of up to 10,000 litres each are the key to the system's effectiveness. The initiative covers 80% of the college's roof space and serves as a reliable source of surface water, reducing reliance on underground water. The collected water is used for various purposes, including irrigating gardens and potted plants and cleaning, promoting sustainable water usage and eco-friendliness. During droughts, the system increases water availability, dilutes groundwater salinity, and improves overall water quality.

Problems Encountered and Resources Required: The rainwater harvesting system required careful consideration of location and size, but after consulting experts and conducting a feasibility study, the setup was prepared with precision. Resources included permits, State Government approvals, budget, funding, expert consultation, catchment areas, pipes, pumps, fittings, filtration, and storage systems. After this was completed no problems were encountered.

Best Practice No. 2

Title: Upliftment and Empowerment of Girl Students

Objective: The college is committed to promoting gender equality and creating a safe and supportive learning environment for all students. The college also works to develop leadership skills among its students, particularly female students, to empower them to take on leadership roles in their chosen fields. This includes providing mentorship and leadership opportunities and promoting diversity and inclusion in all aspects of campus life.

The Context: The college is committed to creating a safe and inclusive environment for its students, particularly when it comes to protecting against gender-based violence. The college recognizes that female students may face unique challenges and barriers to success, and therefore works to ensure that they have equal access to resources that can help them succeed. This includes academic resources, such as tutoring and academic support services, as well as financial aid, scholarships, and career counselling. It provides training and education to faculty, staff, and students to promote awareness and prevention of gender-based violence. The college also provides resources for students who have experienced gender-based violence, including counselling services and referrals to community resources.

The Practice: Red Cross and Red Ribbon Club have installed sanitary napkins vending machines in

girls' washrooms. An awareness lecture was delivered on the topic 'Say NO to CERVICAL CANCER with HPV Vaccination' by Dr Japleen Kaur, Assistant Professor, Dr B.R. Ambedkar State Institute of Medical Sciences, Mohali on 28-04-2023. There was a lack of awareness among many girls about this type of cancer and the fact that it can be prevented. This motivated the girls to get vaccinated and educate their female acquaintances about the prevention method. A self-defence workshop for girls was organised on 12-05-2023 and the resource person was B.S. Handa, Fitness Expert, Martial Arts and Yoga Trainer. Girls were taught how to use daily-use items like purses, sunglasses, phones, etc. as weapons for self-defence, how and where to punch and to always keep the emergency numbers app downloaded on mobile.

Evidence of Success: The general idea behind organizing activities for girls' upliftment and empowerment is to promote gender equality, provide opportunities for personal and professional development, and create a safe and supportive environment for girls to learn and grow. This is achieved through organizing various activities such as workshops, lectures, panel discussions, mentoring programs, leadership training, and community outreach programs. Such activities help girls to build their confidence, develop their skills, and expand their knowledge, which enables them to become self-sufficient and contribute positively to society. In turn, this can help to create a more equitable and inclusive society and empower girls to reach their full potential.

Problems Encountered and Resources Required: The diversity of needs among different groups of women can make it challenging to design programs that appeal to all participants. The resources required include funding, infrastructure such as classrooms or meeting spaces, equipment and materials such as computers or books, trained staff or volunteers, and partnerships or consulting/inviting experts, other organizations or community groups.

Response:

Green Environment and Sustainable Development

The area of distinctive priority for our college is green environment and sustainable development. We

recognize the importance of sustainability and believe in taking concrete actions to protect the environment and promote sustainable practices. We have taken several initiatives to reduce our carbon footprint, including setting up a rainwater harvesting system, creating a green cover, and encouraging the use of renewable energy sources. The college takes great pride in its commitment to sustainability and environmental stewardship, and its campus serves as a prime example of these values.

The college's key priorities in this area are reflected in the following major highlights:

- Home to Rich Flora and Fauna: The college is renowned for its expansive and well-maintained campus, which spans 10 acres of lush greenery. The college's commitment to sustainability is reflected in the number of trees on its campus, with approximately 800 mature trees, including a mini-forest area with around 400 trees. The campus is home to a diverse range of flora and fauna, including trees, gardens, and wildlife such as peacocks.
- **Peacock Reserve:** Our college's distinctiveness lies in the fact that we have established a peacock reserve within our campus. This unique initiative is a testament to our college's commitment to preserving the environment and its biodiversity. This initiative not only reflects our college's dedication to environmental stewardship but also serves as an inspiration for all. It teaches us that nature has inherent value that needs to be preserved for future generations, and we must work towards fulfilling that commitment.
- Vermicomposting Project: The college is implementing its own Vermicomposting Project as part of the G20 initiative, which involves the use of earthworms to convert organic waste into nutrient-rich compost. The MoU was signed with Sh. Pradeep Gautam for the project on February 14, 2023 and the foundation of the project was laid on May 19, 2023. The project is built in an area that has adequate shade and water supply, and the students of Young Farmers Club sold the vermicompost to teachers and gardener on July 06, 2023. Vermicomposting is a cost-effective and environmentally friendly process that offers numerous benefits, such as reducing waste in landfills, improving soil fertility, reducing greenhouse gas emissions, and conserving water. The method involves using a worm bin filled with bedding material and food scraps, which the worms break down to yield nutrient-rich vermicompost that can be used as fertilizer. The production cost of vermicompost is significantly less than that of chemical fertilizers, making it an attractive option for small farmers and anyone seeking sustainable and eco-friendly fertilizers.
- Young Farmers Club: One of the college's most exciting initiatives is the Young Farmers Club, which fosters a love for agriculture and sustainability among students. As part of the club, students are given the responsibility of caring for the college's plantation, including tasks such as digging pits for trees, afforestation, and setting up organic gardens. The major activities

performed by the Young Farmers Club so far are as follows:

- The worthy students of the club have sold the organic produce from the organic garden for Rs. 200.
- The Young Farmers Club of the college regularly organizes meetings with farming experts to discuss new ideas and strategies. They visited DMR, Solan on March 15, 2023 to gain insights into mushroom farming.
- On February 16, 2023, the members of the Young Farmers Club, including professors and students, planted 100 trees in the campus as part of the college's efforts to enhance its ecological footprint.
- The college also organized a workshop on Mushroom Farming and Bio-enzymes on March 6, 2023.
- The Biotechnology Department of the college, in collaboration with the Young Farmers Club and the Horticulture Department in Mohali, organized a workshop on mushroom cultivation on March 16, 2023.
- **Mushroom Farming:** The college's dedication to sustainable agriculture is evident in its various workshops and events. For instance, a workshop on Mushroom Farming and Bio-enzymes was organized in March 2023, and a workshop on mushroom cultivation was held in collaboration with the Biotechnology Department and the Horticulture Department in Solan. The college also invited experts from the United Kingdom to speak on horticulture, mushroom farming, and ecobricks in April 2023, which proved to be an enlightening and informative event for the students.
- Environmental Education: On May 27, 2023, the Department of Botany and Zoology at our college arranged an awareness workshop on 'Lifestyle for Environment.' The workshop's primary goal was to educate students on sustainable living practices that can aid in preserving the environment and enhancing personal well-being. On the occasion of World Environment Day on June 05, 2023, students had the opportunity to visit 'Guru Nanak Bagichi' setup in college, immersing themselves in the soothing sounds of nature and discovering the wonder of biodiversity and Prof. Mandeep Kaur, Department of Botany told the significance of Guru Nanak Bagichi. Mr. Amrish Thakur, Department of Chemistry, delivered a thought-provoking talk-cumpresentation highlighting the urgent need to address the growing menace of plastic pollution.
- Aahar Kranti: In January 2023, the college joined the 'Aahar Kranti' initiative to promote millet-based food in the diet. The Hospitality and Tourism Department, in collaboration with the Nivedita Trust, organized a special lecture to educate staff on the benefits of eating millets. Later, in February 2023, the professors and members of the Young Farmers Club planted 100 trees on the campus, furthering the college's commitment to sustainability.

Beyond the Campus Environmental Initiative: On October 19, 2022, the college's National Service

Scheme (NSS) unit arranged a rally with the theme "Save the Environment," in which multiple teams, each led by ten students, were assigned various villages with the task of educating the community and farmers on the importance of avoiding stubble burning.
